As I wrote my last report we were about to embark on our Bowls Tour to Weston Super Mare. This is a joint venture with Newbury BC. As had been our previous tour in 2019 it was a great success. We played 4 matches at Winscombe BC, Clarence Park BC, Ashcombe Park BC and Bath BC on the way home. We won two matches and lost two. The weather was kind to us and a very enjoyable time was had by all. Our members are very keen to have another tour next year and we are looking into different locations.

On Monday 6th September we had a visiting team from Worthing Pavilion BC who were touring in this area. Gary provided us with an excellent buffet lunch for our 40 guests before the match. The weather was again kind to us and Hungerford won the match 100 shots to 87. We were able to sit outside the Club after the match for drinks and nibbles as by then with the Hungerford players our numbers had grown to around 60.

Our Finals Days were again blessed with fine weather. Congratulations to all our winners.

The Fixture at Andover BC went very well, but the Green proved very difficult and made us appreciate our own Green even more. We lost this game narrowly by only 6 shots but our Captain for the day – Alan Bartter claimed that as a great number of our players had been for their Flu jab the day before this was definitely worth 6 shots which made it a draw.

Our next fixture was against a team made up of players from all over Berkshire. They are called Berkshire VP's and are members who are chosen because of the considerable work they have done for their own Club. This is the only fixture they have been able to play this season – and only because they are all so keen to come to Hungerford to enjoy our Green and our hospitality. Gary again provided us with the after match buffet for the 40 players and guests.

Last Saturday our fixture against Pewsey had to be cancelled at the last moment as they had a player with Covid who had been socialising with other members in the Club, a warning to us all that we are not through this yet.

On Wednesday last we had a Charity Match. Vic Lardner, our President, is involved through his son and granddaughter with Riding for the Disabled based in Chilton Foliat. During the season and culminating in this match the Bowls Section have raised £675 for the charity and as these funds will be able to be added to their Good Exchange appeal they will be worth £1,350 a wonderful result.

Hungerford Club Sloggers v Milton Lilbourne Mavericks - 5th September 2021



This was the Sloggers' return home Twenty20 match against our old rivals, the Milton Lilbourne Mavericks, following our resounding victory at Milton Lilbourne back in July. The weather was warm, and the sun shone, unlike the freezing rainy conditions we faced away at Milton Lilbourne (which, in hindsight, was probably to our advantage).

The Sloggers had a rather depleted team as some of our 'best' players had chosen, unbelievably, to go to a pop concert instead. Fortunately, we found willing volunteers to stand in. One or two had not held a cricket bat or ball for about 30 years, if ever. Anyway, our Bold Eleven duly took to the field, ably captained by the redoubtable and eternally optimistic Gary Williams.

The Mavericks won the toss and elected to bat. The Sloggers got off to a good start by dispatching their Captain and opener, Mark Brodie, LBW for 5, off a good ball by Jay Anstee, in the second over. Unfortunately, their next three batsmen were rather more difficult to remove and between them scored 93 runs. All of whom, Butler, Morse and Horwood, retiring, as the rules decreed, after reaching 30 runs. Each fielder, except the wicketkeeper had to bowl two overs. This meant that after some competent bowling, notably by Jay Anstee, Steve Pennington, Matt Frayn, Charlie Anstee and, especially, Karl MacDonald we got into a bit of trouble. Where bowlers tend to specialise in seam, swing, or spin deliveries, several of ours specialise in 'wides'. Indeed, the enthusiastic, if inaccurate, Andy Downs managed 8 wides in one over. Is this a record? The patient and forgiving umpires might have found even more but were worried that the overs might never end. I believe 34 wides added to the Mavericks score!

There was some good fielding including an excellent catch by Gary Williams to dismiss one of their better (12 yr old) batsmen off a ball by Ann Parker. I think she had lulled them into a false sense of security by bowling several balls at 60 degrees to the wicket before getting one within hitting range. It worked. Sort of. Parker was also kept busy guarding the Pavilion end boundary and attracted many cheers for her athletic, if not always successful, efforts. Neil Harrison proved to be an effective, aggressive and sometimes 'vocal' wicketkeeper (we don't do 'sledging'). Gary Williams, helped by Karl Macdonald, deployed the fielders as effectively as could be hoped for.

At the end of their innings Mavericks were 167 for 7 wickets (3 of whom retired).

The Sloggers went into bat with openers Steve Pennington and Gary Williams. Between them they scored 18 runs. Pennington was clean bowled for 6 and Williams LBW for 12. Karl MacDonald came in and, as is his custom, whacked 30 runs in a flurry of 4s and 6s to all corners of the ground in the space of 3 overs. He then had to retire. The remarkable Andy (Boycott) Downs, batting at No. 5, managed to stay in for 8 overs, during which his bat connected with the ball precisely twice. He was eventually put out of his misery,

Caroline Walker put on an excellent tea which was much appreciated. Alice Anstee provided amusing barracking commentary from the boundary with her megaphone. Alan Walker, as well as assisting with the scoring, celebrated the fall of wickets etc. with deafening blasts from his foghorn. Lt.Col Hugh Stott operated the electronic scoreboard until he had to retire with a headache caused by the heat and, not least, Walker's foghorn.

Much credit goes to the valiant, long-suffering, and patient umpires; Nick Lumley (ex- Constable and opulently attired in his MCC finery), 'Geordie' Broderick (equipped with his white stick) and Edward Sample. It's tiring and stressful work standing out in the field for 4 hours in blazing heat while arguing the odds with disgruntled players. Rather them than me!

So, the Mavericks won back the coveted (if cheap) Barnett Trophy. There were two 'Man of the Match' awards. One went to the young A.Brodie (Mavericks) for his excellent bowling figures. NDLTA Winter League – Call for Interested Players

The new Newbury and District Lawn Tennis Association (NDLTA) winter leagues will commence from Saturday 23 October 2021. The NDLTA Committee has taken the decision to drop the separate Men's and Ladies leagues and instead focus on a single winter league of approximately 5 divisions. This league will follow a hybrid format and each team will require 2 Men and 2 Ladies. Each match will be scheduled for 8 sets and will require 2 courts. Part 1 will see the 2 Men play doubles v the opposition men for 2 sets whilst the ladies play a 2 set ladies double match on the other court. On conclusion of part 1, the pairs will split up to form mixed pairs to play 1 set against each opposition mixed pair. There is no entrance fee for each team.

In addition to this league, clubs are invited to enter teams for a Veteran league aimed at those who can play during the day or under floodlights.
