Tennis Maintenance

Our sports ground always looks magnificent, thanks to Micky Lambourn who maintains the bowling green along with all the grass areas and the front hedges. He is working there every day, but you might have to be an early worm to catch him! He also maintains the entrance path and benches around the bowling green.

Tennis does not have the same dedicated individual to look after the courts and surroundings. We have been fortunate that members have kept the courts in good order, clearing away leaves and bird droppings on a weekly basis, (Saturday mornings between 10 & 12) and preparing the courts for matches and club play. We now have the beginnings of a rota of members to carry out this vital Saturday morning work. Tennis maintenance extends to the hedge alongside the courts, weeding the edges and managing the area under the trees by the canal. To the surprise of many, this is Club land. Sometimes members will need to clear leaves before they can play. We have two cordless blowers for this in the store cupboard. If you need to know the code, contact anyone on the tennis committee. For other work, we have a pressure washer plus hose and cable, (although at present it's a bucket and scrubbing brush job due to the hose pipe ban), a cordless hedge cutter and a cordless brush cutter. If you use any of the cordless tools, please put the batteries on charge ready for the next time.



For serious leaf removal we have a 'billy goat' petrol engine outdoor vacuum machine. Again, this is locked away so ask for access to the key. Before use check the oil level and remember to empty the bag and fill with fuel after use so it's ready for the next time. Please do not fill with fuel on court as any spillage will damage the surface.

The tennis committee is highly appreciative of the work of the volunteers who look after our courts. More volunteers are always welcome, please contact Alex J to add your name to the rota. If you require any guidance on the use of any of the equipment, please contact Chris D. Thank you.

Club Maintenance

Hungerford Club Trees

As we reported in the June newsletter, the Committee had commissioned a report on all the trees growing on Club land in the sports ground area, hence the orange spray marks.

This report included a number of recommendations both to manage the health and balance of the healthy trees and to remove the diseased trees. The Ash trees are suffering from 'Hymenoscyphus fraxineus' commonly known as Ash dieback. This disease destabilises the trees resulting in the eventual collapse. In our location this creates a potential danger to life and property. Therefore the diseased trees are to be removed in line with the report. The report recommendations to improve the healthy trees will also be carried out.

Following the report, tree surgeons were asked to quote; we received two quotes to the specification with a third company declining to quote due to the extent of the works.

As the Croft is designated a 'Conservation Area', permission is required from West Berkshire Council to undertake any works on the trees. This written permission has now been granted.

It is planned to undertake all the works this autumn.

In order for the tree surgeons to access both the garden and the area between the courts and the canal, we will need to take down sections of the tennis court fencing, and then re-install the fence once the work is complete. We will be looking for volunteers for this and will advertise details once we have firm dates. Clearly, whilst this work is undertaken, the tennis courts will be out of use. The tree surgeons understand that any machine movement across the courts will need to be on boards with the court surface fully protected.

Because it will not be possible to use heavy machinery to move substantial sections of timber, the timber will be cut into manageable dimensions and stacked within our boundary. Brush wood will be chipped and the chips sprayed also within our boundary. There will be a quantity of timber available to members to collect, season and log should they so wish. The timber will not be open fire or log burner ready and will need to be reduced in size and seasoned for some time before being used as fire wood.

Due to the necessary work, the garden area (beside the courts and behind the 'Fishermans' Hut) will be closed.

The work is due to start on the 10th October.

Toilets off the snooker room

Andy Pullen has now completed the lovely refurbishment of the toilet off the snooker room. Try it out for yourselves next time you are in the Club! We still require a courtesy notice to be put on the outer door leading to the snooker room asking those entering to be mindful that snooker players may be concentrating on their next move.

Clubhouse roof and Solar Panels

We have now received two "like for like" roofing quotes for the main Club roof replacement tiles. These will shortly be discussed by the Committee. We are awaiting the first Solar Panels quote having already met one contractor. The second firm has been approached but due to work commitments and imminent holidays will not be able to inspect till mid September. Both companies will be provided with the Club's annual electricity consumption figures and asked to design a system that provides a maximum panel coverage to the rear pitched roof area. We are not able to provide any savings to our gas consumption as we do not have a hot water storage cylinder with our type of gas boiler system. We have opted for an integral panel system so that the corresponding roof areas covered by the panels will not require roof tiles, saving us duplicating costs. Also both trades work will be "dovetailed" together so that one scaffold can be used efficiently for both.

Once the two Solar Panel quotes have been received we will ask a Consultant Specialist (John Downe a Club Member) to give his recommendations for which Contractor we should employ as this is a relatively new type of installation and some firms may not be "up to the job" they profess to be able to provide.

Lighting

New emergency lights have been installed inside the Club. The relevant areas around these new lights on the ceiling and walls still requires re-painting.

Damp

Dampness and moisture staining is now manifesting itself in both toilets. We had previously installed low level plastic skirtings but the dampness and staining has soaked upwards. The existing MDF wall panels are becoming very stained and unsightly. These need to be replaced with a different type of panel which is moisture resistant and the hot and cold pipes located behind the panels require lagging to stop condensation.

Picnic Benches

The existing timber benches outside the Club have been repaired by Andy Pullen who very kindly did this urgently on Sunday 28th to save further collapse ... of the benches and those sitting on them!
